



OVERTURE A LA RUSSE WARREN BARKER

Born in Oakland, California, Warren Barker attended the University of California at Los Angeles and later studied composition with Mario Castelnuevo-Tedesco and Henri Pensis. At age 24 he was appointed chief arranger for "The Railroad Hour," the prime musical program of the National Broadcasting Company (NBC). Barker has also been associated with the 20th Century Fox, Columbia and Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios as a composer and conductor for motion pictures and television. For seven years he served as composer/conductor of the highly-rated comedy series "Bewitched." The National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences honored him in 1970 for his original music in the award-winning series "My World And Welcome To It," based on the life of James Thurber. Barker was also on the arranging staff for the Oscar-winning movie *Hello, Dolly*.

From the opening dramatic flourish to the final chord, this exciting, fast moving "tour de force" presents a variety of colors and timbres in the Russian style. A contrasting middle section displays the expressive side of our younger students. *This piece is approximately seven minutes in duration.* — *Kendor Music and C.L. Barnhouse*

MIDWAY MARCHJOHN WILLIAMS

John Williams studied composition at the University of California at Los Angeles with Mario Castelnueovo-Tedesco and later attended the Juilliard School. In 1956, he started working as a session pianist in film orchestras. He has composed the music and served as music director for over 70 films, including *Jaws, E.T., Star Wars, Superman, Raiders of the Lost Ark, Schindler's List, Jurassic Park* and *Memoirs of a Geisha*. Williams has been awarded two Emmys, five Oscars, and seventeen Grammy Awards, as well as several gold and platinum records. From 1980 to 1993, Williams served as conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra. He has written many concert pieces and is also known for his themes and fanfares written for the 1984, 1988, and 1996 Olympics.

This stirring concert march is from the movie *Midway*, produced in 1976, which tells the story of the famous battle in the Pacific. The use of 12/8 time gives a jaunty lilt to this concert march and throughout the work there is a subtle hint of the Scottish highlands. It is an energetic work that abounds with syncopation, containing colorful, challenging upper woodwind parts, consistently building intensity. *This piece is approximately three minutes in duration.* — *www.WindBand.org*

CANYON OF THE EAGLES CLIFTON JAMESON JONES

Clifton Jones is currently the band director at Cypress Grove Intermediate School and director of the Jazz Band at A&M Consolidated High School in College Station, Texas.

His early music influences were playing clarinet and saxophone in the band programs of the Fort Bend I.S.D. schools in Sugar Land, Texas. He studied music theory and composition with Dr. William Thornton at Trinity University in San Antonio; later composition studies were with Dr. Michael Horvit at the University of Houston, and arranging with Shelly Berg at San Jacinto Jr. College.

In *Canyon of the Eagles*, an intense, driving opening depicts the steep rock walls of the canyon before a flowing theme, representing the soaring eagles, is heard. Energy, vitality and beauty have all been combined into this exciting composition. *This piece is approximately four minutes in duration*.

MT. EVEREST ROSSANO GALANTE

Born and raised in Buffalo, New York, Rossano. Galante received his Bachelor of Arts Degree in trumpet performance from SUNY at Buffalo in 1992. That same year he was one of nineteen people across the country to be accepted to the University of Southern California's Film Scoring Program. He studied with the late Jerry Goldsmith, who won an Academy Award for *The Omen*.

Among Galante's film credits as composer or orchestrator include Big Fat Liar, Scary Movie 2, The Tuxedo, and Tuesdays With Morrie. Commissions for his music have come from the Amherst Chamber





Orchestra, Hofstra University Symphonic Band, Nebraska Wind Symphony, Syracuse Symphony Youth Orchestra, and West Genesee High School Wind Ensemble.

Comprised of robust brass melodies, sweeping woodwind lines and rhythmic ostinati, this work captures the epic grandeur and beauty of Everest, the highest mountain on earth. Opening with a grand fanfare, *Mt. Everest* has several contrasting sections that convey the beauty and excitement of the location. *This piece is approximately five minutes in duration.* — *Rossano Galante and Brian Wilson*

Cajuns are descendants of the Acadians, a group of early French colonists who began settling in Acadia (now Nova Scotia) around 1604. In 1755 they were driven out by the British, eventually resettling in South Louisiana. Today there are nearly a million French-speaking descendants of the Acadians living in Louisiana and parts of Texas, preserving many of the customs, traditions, stories, and songs of their ancestors.

"La Belle et le Capitaine" tells the story of a young girl who feigns death to avoid being seduced by a captain. Its dorian melody is remarkably free, shifting back and forth between duple and triple meters. In this arrangement the melody is stated three times. The third time an original countermelody is added in flutes, oboe, clarinet, and trumpet.

"Belle" is about a man who goes away to Texas only to receive word of his sweetheart's illness, forcing him to return to Louisiana. Finding her unconscious upon his return, he pawns his horse to try to save her to no avail. The folk melody is sometimes varied rhythmically, texturally, and coloristically, and an original melody is added for variety. *This piece is approximately seven minutes in duration.* — *Frank Ticheli*

HIGHLIGHTS FROM RETURN OF THE JEDI JOHN WILLIAMS

George Lucas' high energy adventure film *Star Wars* is a highly imaginative entertainment experience that transports the audience to an unknown galaxy thousands of light years from earth. It is a blending of contemporary science fiction with the romantic fantasies of sword and sorcery. The story follows a young man, Luke Skywalker, on a journey through exotic worlds in search for the kidnaped Princess Leia, culminating in a dramatic space dogfight over the huge man-made planet destroyer, Death Star. Composed in 1983, John Williams' score reinforces the high adventure and soaring spirits of the film's story. Continuity is given to the score through themes for each of the characters; these leitmotifs appear in a variety of permutations determined by the dramatic action on the screen. For this medley, arranger Jennings has chosen representative portions and blended them into what might be suitably called an overture. The arrangement retains all of the fire and excitement, tension and exuberance of the original. *This piece is approximately five minutes in duration.* — *www.WindBand.org*

KIRKPATRICK FANFARE ANDREW BOYSEN, JR.

Andrew Boysen, Jr. is presently a professor in the music department at the University of New Hampshire, where he conducts the wind symphony and teaches conducting, composition and orchestration. Previously, Boysen served as an assistant professor and Acting Associate Director of Bands at Indiana State University, where he directed the Marching Sycamores, conducted the symphonic band and taught in the music education department. Prior to that appointment, he was the Director of Bands at Cary-Grove (IL) High School and was the music director and conductor of the Deerfield Community Concert Band. Boysen earned his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in wind conducting at the Eastman School of Music, where he served as conductor of the Eastman Wind





Orchestra and assistant conductor of the Eastman Wind Ensemble. He received his Master of Music degree in wind conducting from Northwestern University in 1993 and his Bachelor of Music degree in music education and music composition from the University of Iowa in 1991.

Kirkpatrick Fanfare was commissioned by Central Missouri State University for the dedication ceremony of the James C. Kirkpatrick Library. Kirkpatrick had been Missouri's secretary of state for twenty years. Then CMSU conductor Patrick Casey described Kirkpatrick as "famously 'Irish' with his humor and attire." Boysen had been made aware that Kirkpatrick was very proud of his Irish heritage, hence the resulting Irish flavor of the music. The piece is based on the Irish tune, "Danny Boy," and variants of the melody are reworked at various points in the music, culminating with a grand brass choir playing the harmonized melody while the woodwinds "dance" above the choir. *This piece is approximately three minutes in duration.*

Scenes from "The Louvre" Norman Dello Joio

A descendent of three generations of Italian organists, Norman Dello Joio grew up in New York City surrounded by musicians and music in his home. He began working as a church organist and choirmaster at the age of 12 and later studied at Juilliard, Tanglewood and the Yale School of Music. Besides teaching, he is a prolific composer, with works for chorus, orchestra and band, along with many solo pieces. He won the Pulitzer Prize in 1957 and an Emmy Award for *The Louvre* in 1965.

Scenes from "The Louvre" is derived from the original score of an NBC television special about the museum that aired in 1964. It covers the period of the museum's development during the Renaissance, with each movement based on themes of Renaissance composers. In September 1965, the composer received the Emmy Award for this score as the most outstanding music written for television in the 1964-65 season. The five movements of this suite cover the period of the famous Paris museum's development during the Renaissance and are based on themes from composers of the period. The movements are titled The Portals, Children's Gallery, The Kings of France, The Nativity Paintings and Finale. The first three are performed tonight. This piece is approximately eight minutes in duration. — BMN

PSALM 46JOHN ZDECHLIK

John Zdechlik is a native of Minneapolis, Minnesota. While playing trumpet and piano with his high school jazz band, he developed an interest in composition. He holds degrees in music education, as well as composition and theory, from the University of Minnesota. Zdechlik is now retired from his position at the Lakewood Community College, where he was a Professor and Chairman of the Music Department. He has written numerous commissioned and published works for high school and college concert bands, including *Celebrations, Chorale and Shaker Dance, Grand Rapids Suite, Passacaglia*, and Z's *Blues.* An active member of the American Bandmasters Association, Zdechlik has conducted in 35 states and in Japan, England, and Scotland.

Psalm 46 is based upon the chorale melody from "A Mighty Fortress is our God," the best known Martin Luther hymn, which was composed sometime between 1527 and 1529. The hymn's words paraphrase Psalm 46. Zdechlik's setting is divided into four major sections with a wide variety of styles and meters that draw to a powerful heroic conclusion. The work, originally published in 1971, is dedicated to Mr. Leon Titus and the Concordia College Band, St. Paul, Minnesota. *This piece is approximately nine minutes in duration.* — *WindBand.us*

Klaus Badelt had a career as film composer in Germany before coming to the United States in 1997. He worked for some time as an arranger for successful film-score composers such as Hans Zimmer. In fact, his move to the U.S. was at the urging of Zimmer, with whom he collaborated for a number of film scores. He has also written original scores on his own, the most striking of which is his score for *Pirates of the Caribbean: The Curse of the Black Pearl.*



The pirates of the Black Pearl capture the beautiful Elizabeth Swann, as they believe her blood will set them free of their curse; by day they appear normal, but by moonlight they are revealed as skeletal zombies. Will Turner sets off to rescue her, enlisting the help of pirate Jack Sparrow, who has his own agenda after being overthrown as captain of the Pearl by the mutinous Captain Barbosa. Walt Disney's *Pirates of the Caribbean*, by Klaus Badelt includes themes from the songs "The Medallion Calls," "The Black Pearl," "To the Pirates Cave," "One Last Shot" and "He's a Pirate." *This piece is approximately seven minutes in duration.* — *Manchester Symphony Orchestra and www.EBSWE.org*

MARCH FROM "1941" JOHN WILLIAMS The march from the movie "1941" is the most memorable part of Steven Spielberg's 1979 production starring John Belushi. The lack of success for the movie may stem from the plot that depicts hysteria in Los Angeles just days after the attack on Pearl Harbor, when fear of a Japanese invasion is imminent. It is hard to appreciate humor in the actions of manic servicemen, zealous store owners, and bickering Nazis, though the march has the bright and patriotic theme that would capture such an

event. This piece is approximately four minutes in duration. — www.WindBand.org

Next to "Summer is icumen in," it is highly probable that the melody known today as "Greensleeves," is the oldest secular piece of music of which we have any documentary evidence. The song has been traced back to the early 14th century, thus making it over 600 years old to date. It was already what we might call a "standard" in Shakespears's time and was used by him on several occasions in his plays, most notably in *The Merry Wives of Windsor*. The melody proved to be equally suitable for Martin Luther's beloved Christmas carol "What Child is This?" *This piece is approximately eight minutes in duration.* — **Band Music Notes**

In the fourteenth chapter of Genesis, there is a story of a rebellion led by Chedorlaomer, the King of Elam. Chedorlaomer and three other Kings joined together to ravage and conquer everything that lay in their path. They were met in battle at the Valley of Siddim (the Salt Sea) by an army mustered from the forces of the King of Sodom, the King of Gommorrah (pre-destruction days, of course...), the King of Admah, the King of Zebolim, and the King of Bela. Unfortunately this opposition army was not a match for Chedorlaomer and each of these city kingdoms, including Sodom and Gomorrah, were overrun. Chedorlaomer's forces, as was the custom, pillaged and fled with all the goods and provisions of the cities. Unfortunately for Chedorlaomer, his men also kidnapped Lot, Abram's brother's son. This of course, is the same Abram who later became Abraham, Father of the

Jewish Nation, and a very close friend of God. (In retrospect, this was probably Chedorlaomer's "notso-bright-decision-of-the-campaign"!) When Abram heard that Lot was taken captive, he armed three hundred and eighteen trained servants who were born in his house and went in pursuit of the invaders. With this small contingent, he divided his forces against the kings, attacked, and routed Chedorlaomer's entire army, recovering Lot and his goods, as well as all the women and people who had been kidnapped during the conquest! *This piece is approximately five minutes in duration*. — *David Holsinger*



Good Evening!

Your students have worked hard to develop a great performance for you tonight. Please observe the following rules to make it enjoyable for all.

- **Refrain from talking.** While the person next to you may be happy to know that your new llama's name is Wilhelmina or that you really enjoy underwater basket weaving, please inform them after the concert not during.
- Please turn off ALL electronic devices. There is nothing like the sound of a phone ringing during the height of a piece of music. If the composer intended to include a sound clip of "Stairway to Heaven" in his piece, he would have written it into one of the students' parts.
- **Don't wave at your student during the concert.** Your student knows you are attending tonight. In fact, you probably brought him or her here.
- Please refrain from taking flash photography. Camera flashes can be distracting and have the possibility of adding a few "extras" to the music that the composer didn't originally envision. Besides, you don't want your student to walk off the edge of the stage from flash blindness, do you?
- **Remain in your seat for the duration of the concert.** Each seat in the auditorium has a great view of the stage and your student. Your camera or video camera works very well from where you are seated. Please do not sit or stand in the aisle for this.
- Please stay to enjoy the entire concert. The students have worked very hard to provide you with an enjoyable evening. Out of respect for all students, do not leave until after all bands have completed their programs. Besides, you might miss an encore (wink, wink!).
- **Applaud at appropriate times.** Students appreciate your applause after a piece you enjoyed. Be aware that some pieces have multiple movements, and applause is only appropriate after the finale of the last. Can you imagine how long the concert would be if we left more time for clapping?
- Do not leave the auditorium during a piece of music. It is disrespectful to cause this distraction for the performers and other audience members. Approved exceptions include removing a screaming child from the auditorium (please do!) or if you are on fire.
- **Enjoy the music!** Why else would you be here?

Failure to observe these rules may result your being required to go on stage and PLAY THE BASSOON.
